Letter from Griselda Ochoa, catechist in El Rodeo, San Marcos

On behalf of my brother and sister catechists in St. Joseph’s Parish, El Rodeo, Diocese of San Marcos, gracious thanks to all for the moral and economic support that you have provided for our formation. We are 18 active catechists that attend to an equal number of communities. Each month, we meet in the parish center to share our experiences from our communities. It is an enjoyable time we spend with each other as we follow our catechetical mission. My name is Griselda Ochoa, and I coordinate the work of my fellow parish catechists.

This group of catechists have received catechetical formation in the Costa and Boca Costa areas of our diocese. Their names are (left to right) Felipe, Juan Alberto, myself, and Blas Gilberto. Every two months, we travel to Pajapita parish to receive instruction / formation. This year, we plan to study the encyclical of Pope Francis, “The Joy of the Gospel.” We need two sessions to finish. Each trip costs \$25 for our food and travel.

Other activities that we perform in our catechesis include pre-sacramental preparation for Baptism, Confirmation, Eucharist and Matrimony. Certainly, the preparation and reception extended to us by the leaders and people of San Marcos, especially the school children, were really very touching.

As we traveled around and visited the different parishes of San Marcos, we saw the various problems the leaders and people face. But deep in my heart I feel that God will always be there to lift up the poor and the lowly. Through the generosity of the faith-filled people of the Diocese of Wilmington together with our Guatemalan brothers and sisters, the people of San Marcos can have, one day, a better tomorrow.

Truly our trip to Guatemala is an eye-opening and rewarding experience for us. Many times we take for granted the blessings God has given us. When we came back from the trip and reflected on these things we became more aware of the presence of God and His generosity.

Reflection by Fr. Glenn Evers, Ss. Peter and Paul, Easton, delegate to San Marcos

On July 30th, we returned to the United States after nine days in Guatemala. As we arrived back into Maryland, I did so with a smile on my face and a happy heart. I felt very blessed by God to have had the opportunity to meet so many wonderful, kind, and generous people. We traveled to several of the churches, schools, and homes that had been helped by our own communities here in the Diocese of Wilmington. Time and time again the people we encountered warmly and enthusiastically greeted us expressing their gratitude for our friendship and all of the good work that had been done for them. New and efficient wood stoves and water purification systems were found in their homes. A church destroyed by the most recent earthquake had its foundation reset. A school was given new bathrooms, computers, and a generator. There was much to be celebrated.

However, one of the most memorable moments for me happened as we were finishing dinner one evening. We stayed with religious sisters in a convent that served as a house of formation for them in San Pablo, Guatemala. They were gracious enough to prepare breakfast and dinner for us every day of our stay. During each meal we would eat with the sisters and converse as best as possible, as not all of our seven member delegation from the United States could speak Spanish. After one dinner was drawing to a close and trying to find common ground between us I asked them if any of them knew the Salve Regina, a popular Catholic Latin Marian hymn. I knew that Fr. John Hynes and I knew it by heart and could sing it with them. And so intoning the hymn, we began to sing and to my great joy and surprise, several members both from our group and theirs began to sing together. At that moment, there were no longer borders between us as our common Faith and this traditional hymn brought us together as one.

What then ensued was an absolute delight. The sisters with their angelic voices then began to sing a hymn in Spanish, then in turn our group followed singing a song in English. We went back and forth singing songs to each other in our native tongues into the night. Everyone had great joy and happiness on their faces and in their hearts as we shared that beautiful evening together in song. After that evening concluded, I then knew that we had friends in Guatemala, because I felt it in my heart. And so for that experience and so many others, I thank God and our Diocese for reaching out and befriending the good people of San Marcos, Guatemala.



Original text in Spanish of letter from Griselda Ochoa...

Mi nombre es Griselda Ochoa y coordino el trabajo de mis hermanos catequistas a nivel parroquial.

Este es el grupo de catequistas que estamos recibiendo formación catequética en la región de Costa y Boca Costa de nuestra Diócesis. Cada dos meses viajamos a la parroquia de Pajapita para recibir dicha formación. Este año propusimos estudiar el documento del Papa Francisco "La alegría del Evangelio" (Evangelii Gaudium). Nos hace falta dos fechas para terminar. En cada viaje gastamos \$ 25.00 para nuestro pasaje y comida.

Una de las características de nuestras asambleas comunitarias es la alegría que nos contagia los que cantan. A pesar de muchas dificultades que pasamos en el trabajo o en la familia nuestros encuentros es muy alegre. Como nos dice la Palabra de Dios “Estén alegres”, nosotros lo vivimos en cada celebración de la Palabra en nuestras pequeñas comunidades. En las celebraciones litúrgicas participan otros ministerios: canto, lectores, ministros extraordinarios de la comunión. Forman parte de nuestras comunidades los niños y jóvenes.

Otras de las actividades que realizamos en la catequesis pre-sacramental. Prepara a los padres de familia para la recepción del sacramento del Bautismo, Confirmación, Eucaristía, ya Matrimonio. Así como estos jóvenes que aparecen en la foto con sus respectivos padres y nuestro párroco.
