### **A new bishop has been named for San Marcos!**



*Monsignor Gómez*

His name is Monsignor Carlos Enrique Trinidad Gómez, originally from Guatemala City. Father Gómez was ordained in 1984. As a former rector of the seminary in Guatemala City, he knows our friends in the diocese of San Marcos well. Padre Silverio Chum of El Rodeo said, “Me parece que se va a adecuar al trabajo pastoral de la diocesis. Por lo que conozco tiene espíritu de trabajar con la gente del campo, los pobres. Seguramente le costará un poco, pero tendrá que responder a la realidad de San Marcos. La ordenación será el sábado 31 de enero en San Marcos.”

*(It seems to me that he will adapt to the pastoral work of the diocese... He has the spirit of working with people in the field, the poor. Surely there will be challenges, but he will have to respond to the reality of San Marcos. The ordination will be on Saturday, 31 January in San Marcos.)*

### **Padre Silverio visited the Wilmington Diocese!**

From October 23 – November 3, Padre Silverio Chum visited the Diocese of Wilmington. Padre Silverio is the pastor of San Jose in El Rodeo and a member of the solidarity committee in San Marcos. He had this to say after his trip:

During his 10-day visit, Padre Silverio visited a number of parishes and schools, and also attended Delight Night. Following are some pictures and accounts of his experiences here.

**Visit to Resurrection Parish, Wilmington**

Fr. Silverio Chum is the pastor of San Jose el Rodeo, the sister parish to Resurrection in San Marcos. In addition to supporting the clinic in Santa Catarina, Resurrection supports the training of catechists so essential to the spiritual life of the far reaching San Jose el Rodeo. Fr. Silverio concelebrated one Mass each weekend during his visit, and spoke about the catechist supported by Resurrection, Griselda Ochoa, in the aldea of Santa Anna. After the Mass on Nov. 2, Resurrection hosted Father Silverio and a Guatemalan family from Seaford. We shared stories of border crossings and daily life in San Marcos, and shared a wonderful (American) lunch. Parishioners from Resurrection sent Fr. Chum away with money to buy 100 children’s bibles to share give to children in the remote villages throughout his parish. –Sandy Landoll, Social Concerns Coordinator at Resurrection Parish, Wilmington.

*During his visits, Padre Silverio described the hardships of coffee farmers: the average income between the equivalent of \$4 to \$5 per day and six months per year without work. He said, “We do not come looking for money or anything like that, we come to know one another better and to share.”*

*One thing that caught his attention was the presence of young Christians at the University of Delaware, “About 100 attended Mass, and then I spoke to a large group of them, who were very interested in learning more of the social reality of Guatemala. It is possible that they will organize a trip to our country to get the feeling of things for themselves,” he said excitedly.*

*Padre Silverio spoke about the fight by farmers in Guatemala to repeal a law requiring them to use only the seeds of transgenic corn and sideline native seed. “It was like stop being ourselves, we are the people of the corn.” It was a battle they won after much effort.*
